Why Native Plants?

- Native plants are naturally designed for the conditions we have here in our yards
- They require less water and fertilizer than exotic species
- And they provide habitat for native birds and butterflies
- Native plants are mostly perennials that return year after year, and are hardy in our climate



Plants for Sunny Places



Coneflower. Easy to find, easy to grow perennials.



Phlox Paniculata. Garden Phlox. A lovely traditional plant with long lasting blooms. Fall Blooming.



Salvia greggii. Texas Sage. Comes in a variety of colors, and attracts hummingbirds and butterflies.

Fothergilla. A beautiful native with interesting flowers. Keeps a nice shape.

Rhododendron. A classic evergreen shrub of the northern piedmont.






Christmas Ferns. Tough as nails native ferns.
